Image: HBOWith Game of Thrones is officially behind us, you're probably asking yourself a lot of tough questions. One of the biggest questions GOT fans asked this week, which is no wonder, how can I cancel HBO now that Game of Thrones is over? If the exciting HBO commercial before the series finale doesn't entice you to keep up that monthly \$14.99 subscription, you're not alone. Eagle-eyed Reddit user Underlander points out that the quest to cancel an HBO subscription took off a bit after this finale. No serious, check out the results of Google Trends: Image: Reddit/UnderlanderIf you have an HBO subscription via HBO Now, HBO's standalone apps, then cancellation is easy. To get rid of the service, you just want to run the app, go to Settings, and then select Cancel Subscription. You'll be able to set a subscription so as not to renew here, which means you'll be able to use it for the rest of the month (or whenever your billing cycle starts), but there will be no charge for it again.iTunesIf your HBO subscription is now billed via iTunes, you'll want to go to the App Store on your device and then choose a profile icon at the top right of the screen on the Today tab. From there, choose Subscription Management. Find a subscription on the page and click on it, then select Cancel and then Confirm. Google PlayOn Google Play, run the Google Play Store app and then tap the burger menu at the top left of the page (three lines stacked on top of each other). For there, choose Subscriptions. Scroll down to the page until you find HBO Now and select it. On the next page, you'll see the option to cancel the subscription at the bottom. Cancelling a subscription is just as easy when you press the undoing button. Other ServicesHBO offers many different ways you can subscribe to the channel, which means there are also a ton of different ways to cancel. You can find detailed instructions on how to cancel your subscription to everything from Frontier to Service Electric on HBO's website here. Game of Thrones will finally return to HBO for its eighth and final season in April 2019. The series is scheduled to premiere in 2020. Led by Jane Goldman, who wrote Kingsman: The Secret Service prequel is set 1,000 years before current events on Game of Thrones. This time, instead of adapting the novel to the small screen, he's adapting a graphic novel: Alan Moore and Dave Gibbons' Watchmen, perhaps the holy grail of comics. But unlike director Zack Snyder's big-budget 2009 film adaptation of the same name, which has received divisive reactions from fans and non-fans of the source material, Lindelof's show is keen to do something different. This story will be set in the world its creators painstakingly built, Lindelof wrote in a lengthy Instagram post almost exactly a year ago. But in the tradition of the work that inspired him, this new story must be original. Right now, all we have is Lindelof's words and a minute teaser to pore over, but it seems to be more than a worthy successor to Game of Thrones with its dense mythology and nerdy target audience. There's no premiere date set for Regina King and Jeremy Ayroords in the show's title role, except for autumn 2019, so while you're waiting, we strongly recommend bingeing on all three superb seasons of Leftovers- or, in fact, on second thought, the pace itself. Darker.3. Insecure (Image credit: Lisa Rose /HBO) Looking to move away from all that violence after eight years of medieval bloodshed and zombie murder? Can't say we blame you - but you don't have to leave HBO to find something a little easier. Enter: Insecure starring Issa Rae (Awkward Black Girl), hilarious, touching and sexy (it's HBO, after all) a 30-minute dramedy entering its fourth season sometime next year. Likely picked up in a small part to replace the void that the girls left in the HBO schedule, Insecure shouldn't be compared to Lena Dunham's six seasons of the NY-centric show at all. This is a totally original, unpretentious and genuinely heartfelt series all its own, with a predominantly black cast and crew to boot. You'll be rooting and cringing for Issa within the same minute, and getting swept in all the romance and drama. So what are you waiting for? The first three seasons are ready to binge on HBO to whet the appetite for a fourth season in 2020.4. Deadwood: Film (Image credit: Warrick Page / Ever hear about a little show called Deadwood? If you don't, don't feel bad; David Milch at Western Premiere 15 15 Back. It's older than some Game of Thrones fans who secretly watch their parents' backs. After three seasons, Durdwood was canceled in 2006, to the chagrin of his devoted fans despite winning several Emmys, a Golden Globe and a Peabody. Its abrupt ending had fans clamoring for more even 13 years later, so HBO finally gave way and greenlit the feature film that would serve as two-hour codes for the original series. His entire cast, including Ian McShane and Timothy Olyphant, returned for the film, which will premiere on Friday, May 31. It still leaves plenty of time to rewatch or first binge it on the existing 36 episodes that still occupy today. Chernobyl (Image: HBO)Mass death toll. Inadequate leadership. The country is at war. Unfortunately, no, it's not fiction, but it makes for compelling and educational television. The five-episode HBO miniseries Chernobyl delves into a catastrophic accident with nuclear radiation at the Chernobyl nuclear power plant near Pripyat, Ukrainian SSR, the most devastating accident at a nuclear power plant in history.
